3 tips for eliciting the /r/ sound - Speech Solutions

If the child is “dentalizing” the sound (letting the tongue touch his teeth when producing the sound), have him place the tip down below the bottom teeth or up towards the alveolar ridge and that will eliminate that problem. Odds are, the child’s tongue tip is in the middle, so moving it up or down will get it off the teeth.

Teaching Sounds in Isolation to Children with Speech ...

The most common label for the SH sound is the “be quiet sound.” We visually cue by putting one finger in front of our mouth, pucker our lips, and blow. The simple act of putting one finger in front of our lips causes us to naturally round them which is necessary to produce this sound correctly. Most of us do not even realize we do this.

So, if the child you are working with can say the /f/ sound, teaching the /v/ sound is easy. Simply tell them to say the /f/ sound and then “turn on” their voice for the /v/ sound. You may want to have them feel the vibrations on their throat or lower lip when making the sound.

If your child can already articulate the “t” and “sh” sounds, you can use these sounds to elicit the “ch” sound. Instruct your child to say the “sh” sound, but to hold his tongue on the roof of his mouth. Have him feel the built up pressure before he releases the air out of his mouth.

Since the /ch/ sound is a combination of two other sounds, the /t/ sound and the /sh/ sound, a great technique to help your child make the sound is to have them say the /t/ and the /sh/ sounds back to back. For example, the phrase “meet ship” begins to sound like “me chip” the faster you say it. Encourage your little one to try this.

Say “ah” or another vowel sound in an empty bucket, paper towel or toilet paper roll, or in a funnel. Animal sounds and other play sounds like car and truck noises such as “beep beep” and “vroom” are powerful play sounds that toddlers love. Exclamatory Words are Play Sounds Too!

That means that your vocal cords are vibrating as air is passed through the mouth to make the /g/ sound. Position the back of your tongue at the near the back of the roof of your mouth, on what is called the soft palate.

How to teach the J sound as in Jump. ... With regard to placement both of these sounds are the same...the only difference is when you make the J sound as in jump...your vocal folds vibrate...so it is a motor on sound...the CH sound is a motor off sound...so your vocal folds do not move.
